

A SHORT HISTORY OF THE AUSTRALIAN BAREFOOT WATER SKI CLUB



In March 1960 a group of keen Water Skiers assembled at Sackville on the Hawkesbury River to be tested and become the first members of the Australian Barefoot Water Ski Club. To join the Club the Skiers had to ski for one minute on their bare feet after stepping off a water ski.

The first successful person to do this was Bruce Purnell from Kyle Bay in Sydney, who was then followed by Ray Leighton, Brian Neal, John Hollands, Jack Murray, Ron Marks and Bruck Wheeler, and these seven skiers hold the distinction of being the first seven barefoot water skiers in Australia, and so they still wear the numbers on their Australian Barefoot Water Ski Club Badges.

The first meeting of the Australian Barefoot Water Ski Club was held at the home of Mr. Bill Burns of Forestville, N.S.W. on the 19th February, 1963, and was attended by Brian Neal in the Chair, John Hollands Secretary, Treasurer, Bill Burns, Ron Bohm, John Challinor, G. Bevin B. McKeon and Bob Yonge.

The first name suggested for the Club was the Australian Barefooters Club, but this was not accepted and the Club was named the Australian Barefoot Water Ski Club.

It was then resolved that the first Australian Barefoot Water Ski Championships be held at Manly Dam in April 1963, and that all States and zones in Australia should be informed of this forthcoming Championship. The Championship attracted 38 competitors, and the first Australian Champion was Irwin Luthiger, and the Championship attracted such well known skiing identities as Ray France, Lionel Kennedy, Robert Tilling, John Hollands, Brian Neal, Bob Yonge, Peter Forrester, Reg Walker, Keith Templeton, Ray Glasson, John Challinor, Eric Baldwin and Irwin Luthiger, and most of those names are still active in Water Skiing to-day.

The official referee was Brian Neal, the official Boat Driver, Ray Clarke, and listed below are the events and explanatory notes on the first barefoot Competition.

The various events that have been evolved are for the purpose of finding not so much who can ski the furthest on their bare feet (which is dependent mainly on water conditions and similar factors), but who can commence to ski the quickest when skiing along on an ordinary ski, and in the figure eight for instance, who has the greatest ability to keep their balance. In all events therefore, the element of luck is not as important as much as ability and tenacity.

EVENT ONE is a straight out race against the clock. The handicap of course is getting rid of the ski for whereas the support gained from one foot is sufficient to hold the skier's weight (with firm footgear as necessary in the rules) the first part is to get the leading foot out of its gear. This is the most difficult part — falls after this are mainly due to trying to "step off" before sufficient speed has been reached."

In EVENT TWO competitors are encouraged to depart from the normal barefoot skiing position and attempt to cross the wash, lifting one foot from the water, points being allocated for the various feats.

EVENT THREE the figure eight competition is the endurance event in which the highest skill is required to avoid falling. Each crossing of the wash presents its difficulties and the centre of the figure where the skier is obliged to cross the boat's own wash is a great hazard. From the competition rules you will see that the points are increased in value on every crossing of the wash, as the rough water generated by the boat increases.

EVENT FOUR is to encourage our skier to depart from the usual methods of "stepping off". Although the thrill of barefoot skiing has to be experienced to be believed 99% of the attempts are made off the single slalom ski.

By encouraging our skiers in these various forms of take-off we hope to eventually see the accomplishment of the three most difficult forms in barefoot skiing, i.e., skiing backwards, starting from the water (deepwater start) with no assistance from skis, etc., and the beach start. John Hollands, The Secretary of the Club has already promised to give £25 trophy to the first person to accomplish these three things.

Within twelve months it is confidently predicted this will be accomplished and the trophy won. Already we know the backwards start has been achieved, the beach take-off on a few occasions (but not consistently) and there are may trying for the deepwater. Although our method of skiing is dangerous, there is not one of our members who would consider giving it up, no matter how many falls they have.

This actually was not achieved until 1970 (by Garry Barton) who I believe is still waiting for his trophy.

This set of Rules are a far cry from the technical set of 1978.

Since that small and humble beginning, the Australian Barefoot Water Ski Club continued to grow in numbers and members and strength of Committees.







Apart from running National Titles each year the Committee also formed a show team and conducted training days, jump days and established means of establishing Endurance Records, I quote from the first President's Report, July, 1964 from the inaugural President Brian Neal "During this period we have conducted two Championship events, the second surpassing success of the first. Through these I felt that we learnt a great deal. Perhaps the most important being that we found out the main purpose of the Club, which is to bring people in Water Skiing together and although the reason was the Championships, the good fellowship was the bi product.

With regard to the Championships they were really an experiment, as we had to make up the Rules as we went along, so novel was the concept. The fact that we were successful means that we are the first such club in the World, and all others can only imitate or copy. Such recognition could easily mean Competitors coming from overseas for the event."

The Second President of the A.B.W.S.C. was John Hollands, elected in November, 1964 and John remained the President until 1969 when Ken Mathews took over as President and conducted the inaugural meeting of the Australian Barefoot Club, National Body, which was held at Wiseman's Ferry, N.S.W. on 28th November, 1970 and had representatives from N.S.W., Queensland, Victoria and South Australia, and this was the beginning of the Australian Barefoot Water Ski Club really becoming a National Body, and then in April 1971, for the first time, the Australian National Barefoot Championships moved out of N.S.W. to South Australia on the Lake Patawolunga. Also in 1970 the A.B.W.S.C. was invited to join the newly formed Divisional Technical Directors of the Australian Water Ski Association, and this offer was accepted and the Australian Barefoot Water Ski Club became the Barefoot Division of Australian Water Ski Association and had their rules sanctioned by the Technical body of the A.W.S.A.

The next step was to have Barefoot accepted as a recognised form of Water Skiing by the World Water Ski Union. Former Australian A.W.S.A. President Alan Clarke, who was a member of the World Water Ski Union Executive Body first presented the Australian rules to that body in 1971 and received the necessary instructions as to how it would be possible to stage the first World Championships.

The two things that had to be established were:

- (a) A set of rules acceptable to the Technical Committee of the W.W.S.U. and
- (b) To show that the sport was a truly World Sport.

In 1973 in Victoria, in conjunction with the Australian National Championships, the first steps were taken to hold a group 3 Championship, where New Zealand sent a team over. Even though the team from New Zealand were very raw the Kiwis gained enough enthusiasm from the Competition to return to New Zealand and form a New Zealand Barefoot Water Ski Club.

We then saw the formation of Clubs throughout Europe, and America and Canada were having competitions, so in 1975 the first official set of rules were sanctioned and accepted by the World Water Ski Union, then in 1977 the first bid for a World Championship was put to the World Water Ski Union in Milan Itlay, at the World Congress, and Australia's bid was accepted. It is now history that Australia is in the midst of staging the 1st World Barefoot Water Ski Championship.

Barefooters throughout the world are now able to witness the event they have been waiting for over many long years.

It has been my pleasure to have carried the negotiations on behalf of Australia and Group III over the last seven years to the W.W.S.U. in various parts of the world.

While there have been many frustrations and necessary hold ups in some cases by the W.W.S.U., it was with great happiness that a final go-ahead for sanction was given me in

Milan in 1977, as Australian President and Group III Secretary General.

I am sure this event, the forerunner of many championships in the future, and the creating factor of the first World Championships in this division, will be remembered by all who assisted in its inauguration.

It is with pleasure that we welcome the W.W.S.U. President J.J. Finsterwald to our shores, and in my capacity as Group President, I extend him a cordial invitation to enjoy the hospitality within Group III.

It would be remiss of me if I failed to mention the magnificent efforts provided by Bob Wing, Barefoot Director of the A.W.S.A. along with his willing workers in Canberra, and the A.B.W.S.C. Without their dedication, there would not be a World Barefoot Championship.

And now, in conclusion, may I wish each competitor the best of luck; may you achieve your aims and reach the standard of competition you had planned. The first World Champions in the Barefoot Division are about to be born.

To the army of Voluntary Officials and workers also our sincere thanks for without their efforts it would be almost impossible to conduct this event.

Finaly to our Competitors, our sincere thanks and best wishes for without them there would be no event to conduct.

Let us now look forward to this Competition for we are about to witness the highest standard of Barefoot Water Skiing ever performed in Australia and the World.

COMPETITION DETAILS

Barefoot Competitions are divided into four events; Barefoot Jump, Start Methods, Tricks and Wake Slalom.

The Jump: Skiers are required to go over an 18" specially constructed ramp and to land as far away from the jump as possible This is a most exciting event with footers now jumping over 50 feet, Skier receives 30% bonus for landing on their feet.

Start Methods: These are various methods of starting off in Barefooting and it is divided into three categories:

1st Method is a frontwards method and consists of Beach Starts, Deepwater Starts, Rope on Toe Stand-ups with a number of other vairations.

2nd Method are tumbleturns either forward or backwards.

3rd Method: Backwards Start Methods which are the same as Group 1, but done in a backwards position.





Tricks: In this event the skier has two passes and has to do as many tricks as possible in each pass which consists of 20 seconds in each pass. The top skiers are known to do up to 20 tricks altogether in their trick runs and have scored over 3,000 points. Tricks include such things as Rope on Neck, 1 foot 180 degree turns and rope on tow, frontwards and backwards and tumbleturns and is a most exciting event.

Wake Slalom: Skier barefoot cross the wake as many times as they can in 20 seconds either forwards or backwards scoring 20 points each cross forwards and 40 backwards skiers receive double points for one foot crosses.
