These athletes train in many different conditions, in various and distant parts of the globe, but all come together today in the small town of Adna, Washington to show the world how they do it in their town.

The Chehalis Indian tribe and south sound cities of Centralia, Chehalis, Adna and Olympia have come together to help us welcome these top athletes to Lake Silverado and introduce barefooting to the residents of this great area of Washington state. We built Lake Silverado nearly fifteen years ago with the interest of creating a world class training facility to prepare ourselves for these types of events and so it was with great honor that we accepted the invitation to host the World Championships. The requirements of a good barefoot tournament are smooth consistent water, fast boats and an energetic, enthusiastic, LOUD crowd. Lake Silverado provides the great water, Sanger and Gekko boats provide the second component and if you, the crowd, can come through with a rebel yell to bring the skiers to their highest we will surely have a memorable world championships for all those who have traveled so far to be with us.

Barefooting is a combination of balance, strength, and speed which when done right is an athletic feat so graceful it brings awe to the viewer, when done wrong brings a gasp of disbelief as the fall generated by the physical forces of speed and water send a skier like a rag doll thrown, tumbling and flipping in unimaginable contortions. We have pet names for these falls that all barefooters know only too well: The stinger, the scorpion, the eye-peeler, all performed unwillingly when the balance and the grace escape us. We hope that there are few examples of these and many examples of the best barefooters at their highest capability.

We welcome all the athletes to America, to Lake Silverado, Washington, and we invite them to bring the best of their world to ours.

CRASH TERMINOLOGY

- Eye Peeler
 - Face First Crash in the water where your eyelids peel back and fill with water. Pain level: 6
- Scorpion
 - Face First Crash with your Chin up! Your back arches, and your feet come up and whack you in the back of the head.
 Usually 5 o6 vertbre pop. Pain level: 9 and a trip to the chiropractor
- Backwards Whipper
 - Catching your heel while skiing backwards. Your feet fly out from under you and there is a moment of silence before the back of you head meets up with the water. Pain level: 6 and a bit of whiplash
- Steve Austin
 - Any high speed whack where you slide, bounce, skip and spin before you dig in like a 747 hitting the desert. Pain level: 7 but it looks like a 10
- Starfish
 - · Head, Feet, Head, Feet, While the arms and legs flap like a rag in the wind. Pain level: 8 and usually a pulled shoulder
- Day Ender
 - Just like it sounds. We never know what went wrong. We just get back in the boat, because the day is over. Pain Level: 9
 Go get a beer
- The Chicken
 - The Non-Crash. One lets go of the rope because "There was water in my face" or I got scared and didn't want to crash".
 Pain Level: O Chicken!
- The Wishbone
 - Usually happens while doing toe turns or trying to impress the girls. One foot catches in the water and pulls you out like a
 wishbone. Pain Level: 9 and two weeks of Physio
- The Slide
 - A missed trick, or an unknown wipe out where you gently slide across the water to a smooth stop. (This is rare) Pain Level: 1 and feeling very, very lucky
- The Body Slap
 - Trying to do something cool for a photo. Surf Shorts, sunglasses, and no shirt. Then you crash. It stings like a thousand bees...and no warranty on your sunglasses

BAREFOOT WATER SKIING HISTORY AND DESCRIPTION Although barefoot slalom, tricks and jumping water ski events are very similar to traditional events, the major difference here is, you guessed it, participants do not wear skis. In the slalom event, an athlete earns points for crossing the boat wakes in a course that does not have buoys. In tricks, an athlete attempts to perform as many tricks as he can during two 15-second passes. Each trick has a pre-assigned point value and an athlete may perform each trick only once. The athlete who earns the most points wins the event. In the jumping event, the ramp height is only 18 inches (45.5 centimeters), but the boat speed is more than 40 miles per hour, which is feet-burning fast! Faster boat speeds are required for an athlete to plane on his two bare feet. There are no hand tools needed to make barefoot equipment repairs, only a tube of super glue. If a blister or cut opens on the bottom of an athlete's foot, standard procedure is to glue it shut now to finish skiing and deal with the stitches later. In addition to slalom, tricks and jumping, barefoot athletes also participate in figure eight competitions and endurance events where the athlete who stays up the longest is the winner. Barefoot water skiing began in Florida as a recreational activity in the late 1940s and was quickly introduced into the water ski shows at Cypress Gardens, Fla. Interest in barefooting grew, and in 1961 USA Water Ski organized the American Barefoot Club (ABC). Today, the ABC is a sport division of USA Water Ski, the national governing body for the sport of water skiing in the United States. Originally, membership in the ABC was reserved for barefooters who could stay on their feet for a minimum of 60 seconds. The barefoot craze spread overseas, becoming especially popular among the Australians, who eventually organized the first barefoot tournaments. They were patterned after conventional competition, with an added discipline called "start methods," which has since been discontinued. Today, barefooting is a world-wide sport recognized by the International Water Ski Federation, the world governing body of water skiing. A World Championships is held every two World Championship title 10 consecutive times - 1986 in Kelheim, West years.
